Mary Beth I (PHSC): There is an EASY card for residents whose incomes are less than \$21,870 per year which allows

Client Name: Patron

Initial Question: I am researching background material on the Snowqueen by J.D. Vinge. She says in her website - archived on the wayback site, that she uses an older version of the HCA Snow Queen. I am trying to find this older version but have had no luck with online sources such as your standard google and wiki searches.

Laura (State Library of Florida): Hello, my name is Laura and I am with the State Library of Florida. is there any indication what time period (decade or century) for the Snow Queen that Vinge used? If not, it may be necessary to try to identify how many editions/revisions of the story have been published.

Patron: Hello Laura, hang on and I will attempt a copy paste

Patron: I'm especially fond of "The Snow Queen" - not Hans Christian Andersen's work, but the original northern European myth about the seasons, in which the main characters are all female, and "Prince" is the victim needing to be rescued; peripheral male characters are all played by symbolic animals from ancient pagan religion.

Patron: This is what I have to go on

Laura (State Library of Florida): oh I see! She referenced a story predating HCA?

Laura (State Library of Florida): What he based it on?

Patron: It seems so.... but to be honest some of the HCA elements crept back into her novel

Laura (State Library of Florida): Thanks, I'll see if I can identify a similar legend/myth, or if someone else has connected one.

Patron: thank you very much. Is there any other information I can supply?

Laura (State Library of Florida): I remember reading one when I was a kid called "east of the sun and west of the moon" that had similar elements, but I've never compared the two.

Patron: Gosh, that one is ringing bells.....

Laura (State Library of Florida): I found a very interesting blog entry from someone with publisher tor.com!

Laura (State Library of Florida): It says he was inspired by 1001 nights and East of the sun, west of the moon, which is also related to cupid and psyche/beauty and the beast!

Patron: Interesting indeed. It's amazing how we retell these stories to meet our needs.

Laura (State Library of Florida): Definitely. I can't be certain without the author confirming it, but it sounds like East of the Sun is a contender.

Patron: I am remembering an index of folktales? could that be a way to track it down?

Laura (State Library of Florida): might be? There's definitely a lot of collections, I'll see if I can find something concrete

Laura (State Library of Florida): Yes! There is a catalog called the Aarne-Thompson-Uther index originally proposed in 1910 and it's used in tandem with the Motif-index of folk-literature published in 1932.

Laura (State Library of Florida): there's also a 2004 title that might interest you ...

Laura (State Library of Florida): It's " The Types of International Folktales: A Classification and Bibliography"

Patron: I don't suppose they are available online - that would be a surprise

Laura (State Library of Florida): I'm not sure how widely these are available, but your local library may be able to get the 2004 through inter-library loan

Laura (State Library of Florida): The 1932 might be somewhere like archive.org or project gutenberg?

Laura (State Library of Florida): University of Missouri has links: https://libraryguides.missouri.edu/c.php?g=651166 **Patron:** Oh my stars! Types of International Folktales: A Classification and Bibliography is \$1,599.97 in a quick search in amazon

Laura (State Library of Florida): It looks like one is Hathi trust which likely needs a login,
